



# RALEIGH LITTLE THEATRE

A Guide to Attending Performances  
In the Stephenson Amphitheatre on  
the campus of Raleigh Little Theatre



**Take a look at what you'll see when you visit  
Raleigh Little Theatre!**

When I get to Raleigh Little Theatre, we will need to find parking. Some parking is available in the big parking lot on Pogue Street, including wheelchair accessible parking.



We can also park in the neighborhood near the theatre, where there is plenty of street parking.



Once we get out of the car, it's time to put on our masks.



This is an outdoor theatre, and we need to bring our own blankets, chairs or cushions if we want them.



If we didn't already buy our tickets, we can buy them at the Sutton Theatre box office, where the person working will help us.



We will talk to them through the glass.  
We might have to wait for a little bit if there are other people in line.



If we already have our tickets, we will go to the big parking lot where another box office person is working. We will tell them our name, and they will check us off their list.



After we are checked off on the list, each person in my family will pick up a colored wristband to wear while we are at the show. This helps the theatre know who has already checked in.



Restrooms are located in the lobby of the Sutton Theatre. There are steps from the amphitheatre or we can use the ramp through the parking lot to get up there.



The restroom doors look like this:



Some benches will have signs that say “No Seating.” This keeps a safe distance between us and the other families here to see the show.



We can take our masks off when we are seated, but need to put them on whenever we leave our seating area.



Wheelchair accessible seating is located in two places:

First, the back of the seating area, accessed by a ramp from the main parking lot.



The other choice for wheelchair seating is close to the stage. To enter this area, we can use the smaller parking lot entrance on Pogue Street across from Everett Street. There is also a wheelchair accessible porta john at this entrance.





## It's time for the show!

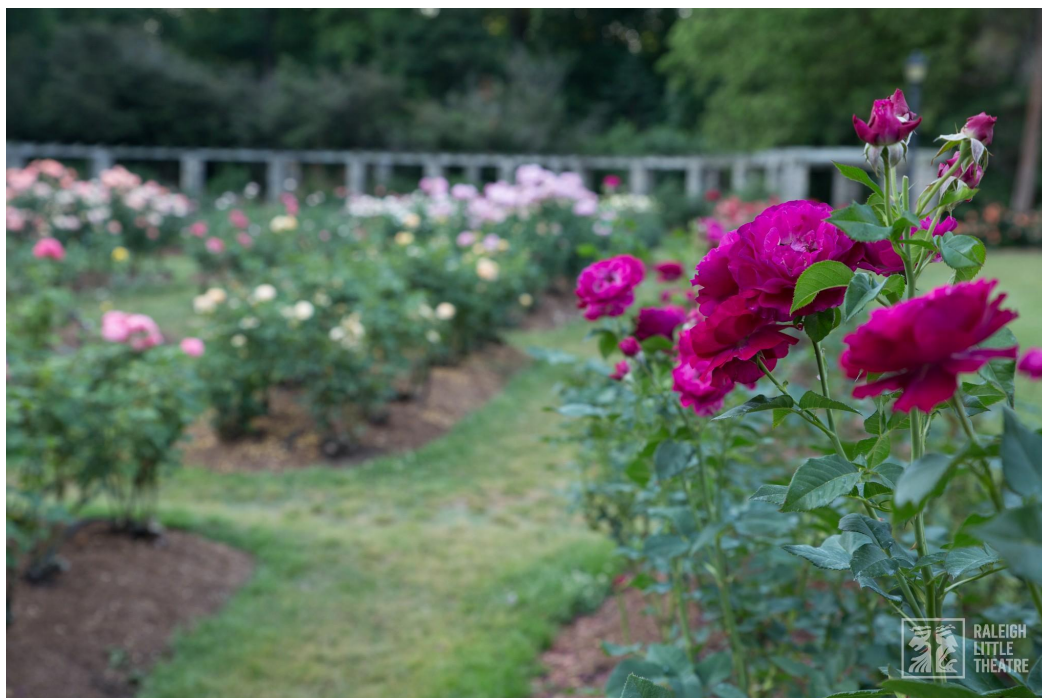
The people on stage are called actors.  
They are pretending to be someone else to tell a story.



People might clap during the show. I can clap too,  
and I can cover my ears or wear my headphones if it gets too loud.



If I need a break, I can tell an adult and we can go out to the Rose Garden or to the sidewalk near the parking lot where it is quieter.



When the show is over, I can clap and cheer when the actors come out on stage to take their bows.
