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

Letter from the Director

Welcome to *Something Rotten!* This show is an effervescent imagining of Renaissance theatre, filled with humor, heart, and lots of irreverence. Set in 1595, it follows the Bottom brothers, Nick (actor/producer, played by Erik Agle) and Nigel (playwright, played by Michael Sheehy), as they struggle to find success in the shadow of William Shakespeare, the rockstar of the era.

Throughout the Bottom brothers' search for success, one thing becomes apparent: commercial success, personal success, and artistic success are not all the same thing. Nick has to learn that making money is not the only measure of success; Nigel has already figured out that meaningful, creative work can also feed the soul. Though Nick is attempting to steal from Shakespeare, and Shakespeare keeps trying to steal from Nigel, it's "the system" that has rotted them. It's the same misguided mindset among artists today that success in the theatre only means success on Broadway. Successful theatre lives right here in communities like ours.

Which gets me thinking: How does the commercially competitive world of Shakespeare's London and professional theatre in 2024 compare to a community theatre such as Raleigh Little Theatre? Community theatre is exactly that: by and for the community at large.

The exciting part of directing *Something Rotten!* has been bringing together artists with varying skill sets to create this story. Choreographer Freddie-Lee Heath, music director McCrae Hardy, and I assembled a company of dancers, singers, and actors, some of whom are appearing on a theatrical stage for the first time, while some have been performing for decades. What a beautiful thing! We have created a new language together to communicate and share our talents, engaging each other in storytelling, being vulnerable and daring to try new things, all for our love of live performance and the audience who sees it. That is the mission of Raleigh Little Theatre - to enrich, educate, entertain and engage.

Something Rotten! is a meta-musical, a show that acknowledges in various ways that it's a show, referencing not just the story but the actual performance of it. One thing I love about this show is its title, from the famous Hamlet quote, "There's something rotten in the state of Denmark." It also describes Nick Bottom's scheme (and Shakespeare's too). But it also refers to the hilariously bad musical-within-themusical Omelette. Both Omelette and the eggs (the actors) are rotten. The other part I love is that its take on Shakespeare offers up the coolest meta device. An actor (Brian Westbrook) plays Shakespeare, who disguises himself as Toby, who then "plays" Uncle Scar. It's dizzying!

There is a whole smorgasbord of wild, smart, meta-theatrical stuff - as well as all the quotes from Shakespeare's prolific writings - in *Something Rotten!* The higher the stakes for these characters as the story moves forward, the more serious their desperation, and the wackier the comedy gets. *Something Rotten!* is a love letter to theatre and it is a joy to bring it to you. Thank you for supporting live theatre in the Triangle!

Program Notes

Sure, "All the world's a stage," but this particular stage is set to about 430 years ago. If you're wondering what the Renaissance is, what this Shakespeare guy is really about, or how any of this relates to musical theatre today, then let's set the scene.

The Renaissance was a time of looking back and reflecting on the past. The very word "Renaissance," coined in the 16th century by writer Giorgio Vasari, literally means "rebirth." It was a fitting name: the Renaissance was a movement of art, literature, and learning that borrowed from and revitalized the ideas of Ancient Greek and Roman thinkers and artists, moving away from the Middle Ages and to newer and better things. And naturally, this movement spread to the theatres, bringing a new wave of interest to the stage.

Enter Shakespeare, one of the most well-known figures to come out of Renaissance theatre (or even theatre in general). An English playwright, actor, and poet, Shakespeare is most famous for his plays: Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Macbeth, Twelfth Night, and many more. Even today, these works are the subjects of hundreds of films, classes, literature, and of course, stage performances. In Shakespeare's plays, we see the ideas of the Renaissance reflected: plays' themes of political powers reflected conflict on the throne, themes of inheritance reflected the power of money and the barriers that it presented to Elizabethans, and so on. Many of the concerns that existed then – political powers, classism, war, money, gender, and more – are still relevant today, and looking back gives us a fuller understanding of these issues over time and how attitudes have evolved.

Contemporary attitudes and Shakespeare's writing come together in a unique way in Something Rotten!, where the Kirkpatrick brothers posed the question: What if the theatre scene of Shakespeare's London looked like 1930s Broadway?

Their answer was the story of Nick and Nigel Bottom, who try to revolutionize theatre by bringing the very first musical to the stage.

The roots of the musical go back to Ancient Greece, where music would sometimes accompany plays, and to opera, which emphasized telling stories through song, yet the modern musical did not emerge until the 19th century. But in *Something Rotten!*, the phenomenon of the Broadway musical comes crashing into the Elizabethan theatre scene. Dance breaks, tap shoes, kick lines, and all the conventions of the modern musical converge with the world of the Renaissance. In a time when women weren't allowed to act on stage, and theatres were dependent on funding from wealthy patrons, the Kirkpatricks explore how antiquated ideas from the past converge with the Renaissance's hope for progress, and how from the Renaissance, we can see signs of progress in the world today.

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
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
